ARE YOU STRIVING FOR THE PRIZE? 1 Corinthians 9:24-27 says, Know ye not that they which run in a race run all, but one receiveth the prize? So run, that ye may obtain. And every man that striveth for the mastery is temperate in all things. Now they do it to obtain a corruptible crown; but we an incorruptible. I therefore so run, not as uncertainly; so fight I, not as one that beateth the air: But I keep under my body, and bring it unto subjection: lest that by any means, when I have preached to others, I myself should be a castaway. Looking at this passage of scripture, I want to point out 3 major elements from a cultural perspective of that day...

- 1. The PROMISE of a new season, a new race, etc. In the passage, Paul draws on the Corinthians' knowledge of the Isthmian games, held every two years in Corinth. In a race, they all run, but one receives the prize. In a new race, a new season, everyone has the promise of a new beginning the promise that if I am good enough, I can win. However, in a race, in a season, in a game, only one person or one team can receive the prize. Therefore they run to obtain that prize...
- 2. The PROCESS self-discipline, temperance. An athlete must be disciplined if he is to win the race. Discipline means giving up the good and the better for the best. The athlete must watch his diet as well as his time, because they will interfere with their highest goals, which is striving for mastery in their particular sport. Only citizens were allowed to participate in the games, and they had to obey the rules both in their training and in their performing. Keeping the rules without penalty also takes discipline and temperance (governing yourself in private and in public...)
- 3. The PRIZE A corruptible crown. When the games were all over the runners, wrestlers, and successful contestants assembled before the "Bema," or Judges' stand, which was an elevated seat on which the Umpire sat, and the winners received a crown or laurel leaves. The crown, or "stephanos," (means "to twine or wreathe") was a badge of royalty or a prize in the public games or even a symbol of honor. Some had no reward, they had lost the "victor's crown." But while there was no reward there was no punishment, they were not cast out. However, because these crowns of laurel leaves would decay, they were considered by the Apostle Paul as "corruptible crowns." We have all competed in one form or another in order to achieve mastery in our particular sport in order to win the trophy, certificate, ribbon, etc. The crown is a symbol of victory and reward, yet were corruptible crowns.

The Corinthian church that Paul was speaking to in this passage were believers in Jesus Christ yet acting in many aspects very worldly - being known as "carnal Christians." Therefore, in our lives, as we struggle between the "flesh" and the "Spirit," we have the same three elements in our Spiritual lives as well...

1. The PROMISE - of a new life in Christ. The analogy used here is these Greek and Roman games. Understand that the Christian does not run the race in order to get to heaven. The Christian is in the race because he has been saved by grace through faith in

Jesus Christ. We are in the race and are given the tools and resources to run our race in life, to "play our game" so to speak. Our Time, Talents, Treasure, and Temple of our bodies are given to us by the Lord to use for His glory, not ours. They are given by us to do His will - to spread the gospel - the good news about Him to others...

- 2. The PROCESS self-discipline and temperance in the Christian life. Paul says in verse 26, I therefore run, not as uncertainly (not aimlessly, for I have a GOAL for which to run, I don't wander). Paul also says in the same verse, so fight I, not as one that beateth the air. This refers to wild misses during an actual boxing match. Paul says in order to fight the good fight of faith you must hit something not miss the mark due to sin or not being self-disciplined. About 10 years ago, we witnessed the steroid controversy in baseball as well as in the Olympics, for any contestant found breaking the training rules were automatically disqualified. There are many baseball "heroes" from the 1990s who probably will not go into the Hall of Fame, because they "cheated the game." In his own life, in order to give up his rights and have the joy of seeing a lost soul won to Jesus Christ, Paul had to discipline himself. That is the emphasis of this passage Authority or rights MUST BE BALANCED by discipline! If we want to serve the Lord and win His reward and approval, we must pay the price. This incorruptible crown is for those Christians who do not yield to their fleshly lusts, just as athletes keep their bodies under subjection. Those who do not permit themselves to be diverted from the Master's work by worldly amusements and pleasure, nor saturate their body with drugs, alcohol, or other things not honorable to God...
- 3. The PRIZE an incorruptible crown. While trophies and crowns that are corruptible or temporal all will fall apart one day and be forgotten, what is done for Christ will never be forgotten. There is a reward! The word "castaway" was a technical word familiar to those who knew the Greek games. It means "disapproved or disqualified." At the games, there was a herald who announced the rules of the contest, the names of the contestants, and the names and cities of the winners. He would also announce the names of any contestants who were disqualified. Paul was concerned that he would get so busy trying to help others in the race that he would ignore himself and find himself disqualified (remember NOT his salvation but the crown). Paul did not want to lose his reward. He wanted to keep his body under control and keep his eyes on the goal. He had one goal in life to GLORIFY HIS LORD AND SAVIOR by winning the lost and building up the saints to the extent he was willing even to give up his personal rights!

How about your life? If you have accepted Christ as your personal Savior and have a relationship with Him - you have a PROMISE for a new life, for you are in a new race. The challenge is "SO RUN that you can obtain the prize!" You also have a PROCESS you must follow in order to run this race of life - follow the rules, discipline yourselves unto holiness! We do not want to be ashamed at Jesus' coming (I John 2:28.) A good principle to live by is Whatsoever therefore ye eat or drink, or whatsoever ye do, do all to the glory of God."(I Corinthians 10:31) Our goal - an incorruptible crown that we can cast at Jesus' feet, because He is the reason we run and live and breathe to begin with! - By Pastor Dean Chambers, December 3, 2013
