**FREEDOM IS NEVER FREE:** (From an article I once clipped back when I taught U.S. History) Have you ever wondered what happened to the 56 men who signed the Declaration of Independence? Five signers were captured by the British as traitors, and tortured before they died. Twelve had their homes ransacked and burned. Two lost their sons serving in the Continental Army; another had two sons

captured. Nine of the 56 fought and died from wounds or hardships of the Revolutionary War. They signed and they pledged their lives, their fortunes, and their sacred honor. What kind of men were they? Twenty-four were lawyers and jurists. Eleven were merchants, nine were farmers and large plantation owners; all were men of means, well educated. But they signed the Declaration of Independence knowing full well that the penalty would be death if they were captured. Carter Braxton of Virginia, a wealthy planter and trader, saw his ships swept from the seas by the British Navy. He sold his home and properties to pay his debts, and died in rags.



Thomas McKearn was so hounded by the British that he was forced to move his family almost constantly. He served in the Congress without pay, and his family was kept in hiding. His possessions were taken from him, and poverty was his reward. Vandals or soldiers looted the properties of Dillery, Hall, Clymer, Walton, Gwinnett, Heyward, Ruttledge, and Middleton. At the battle of Yorktown, Thomas Nelson, Jr. noted that the British General Cornwallis had taken over the Nelson home for his headquarters. He quietly urged General George Washington to open fire. The home was destroyed, and Nelson died bankrupt. Francis Lewis had his home and properties destroyed. The enemy jailed his wife, and she died within a few months. John Hart was driven from his wife's bedside as she was dying. Their 13 children fled for their lives. His fields and his gristmill were laid to waste. For more than a year he lived in forests and caves, returning home to find his wife dead and his children vanished. A few weeks later he died from exhaustion and a broken heart. Norris and Livingston suffered similar fates. They gave you and me a free and independent America. The history books never told you a lot about what happened in the Revolutionary War. We didn't fight just the British. We were British subjects at that time and we fought our own government! Some of us take these liberties so much for granted, but we shouldn't. So, take a few minutes while enjoying your 4<sup>th</sup> of July holiday and silently thank these patriots, and thank the Lord for using them to give us the freedom that we have. We need to realize that true patriots are willing to pay a price, not just for their own freedom, but for the liberty of their children and grandchildren as well as all of their countrymen. Remember that liberty comes with a price and that it can be easily taken away. Freedom is never free.

**IF YOU CAN KEEP IT:** I wanted to recommend a good book this Independence Day season. *If You Can Keep It* by Eric Metaxas. In 1787, when the Constitution was drafted, a woman asked Ben Franklin what the founders had given the American people. "A republic," he shot back, "if you can keep it." The author uses this book and examines what that means and how we are doing on that score today. Metaxas explains in this book that America is a radical and unprecedented idea, based upon liberty and freedom for all. The part that is worth the price of the book is chapter 3, entitled "The Wonder of the Age," which is a brief but thorough biography on the ministry and preaching of George Whitefield during the revival of the First Great Awakening in America, which along with other ministers during the time, prepared a nation for Independence. This 260 page book is well written, and I highly recommend it to any US History buff or any American learning about our heritage and foundations as a nation.
